The mission of the Frankenmuth James E Wickson District Library is to provide quality services including books and other materials, programs, facilities and access to all forms of available media to help meet the educational, informational, cultural, and leisure time needs of the Frankenmuth service area.

Some of these services occurred within best practices for literacy success including physical additions to the children's wing. With the help of The Friends of the Library and MI-CAPP, an interactive sensory wall was installed and quickly became a popular area to play. Flexible seating, choices in book formats such of Vox talking books, audio and book pairings and a braille Story Walk aimed toward inclusion. The library has always been a welcoming place for kids in the summer, but afterschool programs and tutoring sessions made the library come alive on school weekdays. Early in the day, our littlest patrons were found singing, dancing and reading during our specialized Early Literacy Story Time sessions. Adults occupy the upstairs tables to play Mah Jongg, convene in the conference room to discuss books, express their creativity and fill our program space during our Constitution Seminars and special events. The conference room hosts a variety of groups for meetings, scouts, women's club and condo associations. We continue pursuing community partnerships through outreach and collaboration with the schools, farmer's market, community education and our retirement community. Our building footprint hasn't changed much in the last 20 years so the need to creatively use our existing space has never been so important. The present need for additional private meeting rooms is part of our strategic planning.



The Friends organize an ongoing used book sale in the library basement. The proceeds are used to fund library projects such as new carpeting and summer reading prizes.
